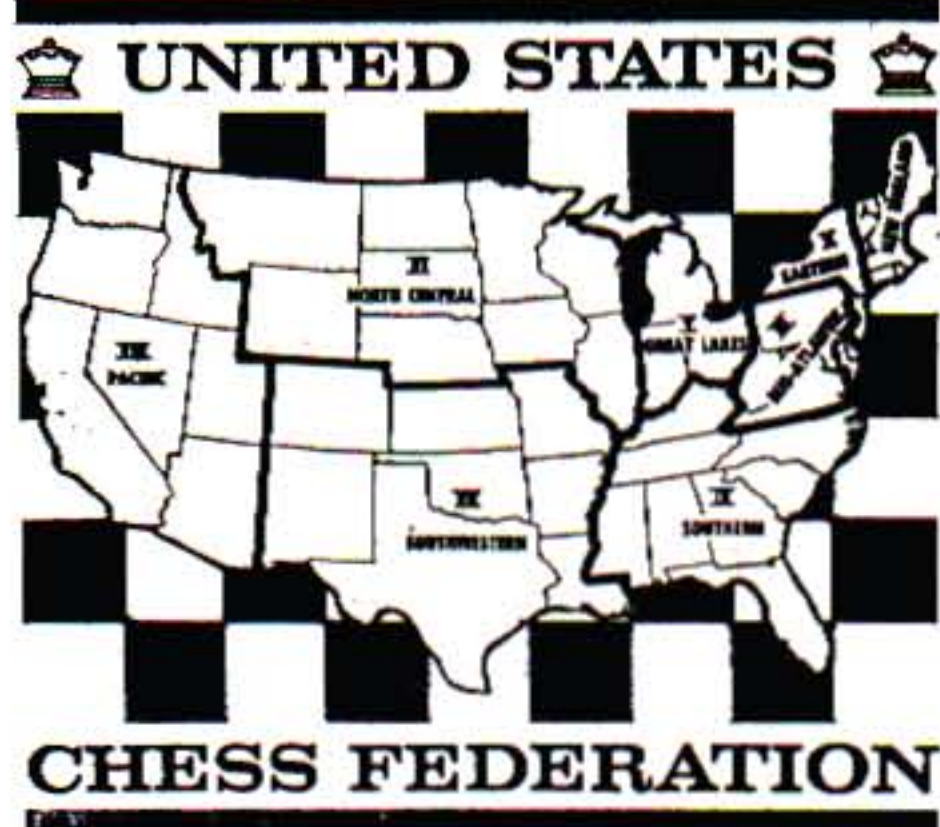

CHESS LIFE

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BENKO, LOMBARDY TIE IN U. S. OPEN

Grandmasters Pal Benko and William Lombardy tied for first in the 1965 United States Open, played in San Juan, Puerto Rico. In accordance with USCF regulations in effect since 1963, they were proclaimed co-champions.

Both players finished with scores of 10-2, Lombardy earning a tie by defeating Matthew Green in the last round while Benko drew with Edmar Mednis. Benko was undefeated; Lombardy lost once — to Bernard Zuckerman in an eighth round upset.

Grandmaster Robert Byrne, recovering from a stunning first-round defeat, finished in third place with a score of 9-3. Zuckerman took fourth and Duncan Suttles was fifth, also with 9-3.

A total of 163 players turned out for the first U.S. Open ever held outside the continental United States. This year's Open was thus considerably smaller than the monster events of '63 and '64 in Chicago and Boston. It included, however, a fine turnout of about fifty Puerto Rican players—most of whom were playing in their first USCF event.

Placing sixth through twelfth—with 8½ points—were Edward Formanek, Edmar Mednis, Canadians Zvonko Vranesic and Leslie Witt, Asa Hoffmann, Erich Marchand and William Hook.

A tie also developed in the Women's Division, Mary Bain and Kathryn Slater finishing with top scores of 6½. Mrs. Slater was co-champion last year in Boston when she tied with Cecilia Rock.

Special prizes were offered for the highest-scoring Puerto Rican players. Julio Kaplan, a promising junior from Argentina who now lives in Puerto Rico, tied with Donato Rivera at 8 points to lead the local players. Miguel Colon and Luis Suarez were next in line with 7½ points.

The tournament was played at the University of Puerto Rico in Rio Piedras. The local organizers, led by Narciso Rabell-Mendez and Francisco Torregrosa, provided a large variety of activities for the players during their non-playing hours—including an inauguration party, daily trips to the beach, a tour of Old San Juan and a visit to the El Yunque Rain Forest. Their hard work and gracious hospitality received official recognition and a standing ovation at the USCF business meeting.

FISCHER PLAYS BY TELETYPE!

U. S. Champion Robert J. Fischer has made a dramatic reappearance in the international chess arena.

By special arrangement Fischer is taking part in the Fourth Capablanca Memorial Tournament, now under way in Havana, Cuba. Denied permission by the U.S. State Department to travel to Cuba, Fischer is playing all his games from the Marshall Chess Club in New York City. Moves are being transmitted and received by teletype. There is also a direct telephone line between the New York club and the Havana playing site.

The first move was received in New York shortly after 8 p.m. on Wednesday, August 25. Fischer's first-round opponent, Heinz Lehmann of West Germany, opened with 1. P-K4. Fischer set up a Sicilian Defense and scored an impressive win in 32 moves. When Lehmann's resignation was received—at about 2:30 a.m.—a large number of spectators were still on hand to applaud the Fischer victory. Word arrived from Havana: "Crowd here cheers Fischer".

In the second round, the next day, Fischer had white against ex-world champion Vassily Smyslov. Fischer played a slow line, delayed castling, and set up pawns on Q3 and QB3. Smyslov played conservatively and offered a draw on the twenty-fifth move which Fischer declined. Fischer slowly gained the upper hand in a rook-and-minor-pieces ending. The game was adjourned in a position

E. Forry Laucks

Players at the United States Open were shocked and saddened by the sudden death of E. Forry Laucks on Saturday evening, July 31. Mr. Laucks, a participant in the Open, had played the first six rounds and seemed to be in good health and spirits. Accompanying a large group of chessplayers on a tour of San Juan, he collapsed suddenly and was pronounced dead upon his arrival at a nearby hospital.

Mr. Laucks, a Life Director of the USCF, was most famous as the founder and patron of the Log Cabin Chess Club. This unique chess organization, founded in 1934, was located at 30 Collamore Terrace, West Orange, N.J., and was visited by thousands of players—including all the outstanding American masters. Hospitality at the Log Cabin was proverbial; proverbial also were the many chess trips and excursions that Mr. Laucks and the club members made to many points in the United States, Canada, Central America, Cuba, and Europe. In 1958 alone, the club sent representatives to eleven countries.

The Log Cabin played for many years in the Metropolitan Chess League in New York City and in 1945 won the league championship. From August 7 to August 22, 1959 the club was the scene of one of the greatest master tournaments ever held in this country—the United States Seeded Championship. This event, held in celebration of the club's Silver Anniversary, was limited to ten of the strongest players in the nation. William Lombardy was the winner, followed by Benko, Evans, Bisguier, and Robert Byrne. Mr. Laucks provided an unusually generous prize fund: first prize was \$1200, second \$1000, with the others in proportion. Play was held at the Log Cabin and at Mary Bain's Chess Studio in New York City.

Although the Log Cabin had not been as active in the last few years as previously, Mr. Laucks had lost none of his enthusiasm for chess promotion. Only a few days before his death, he was outlining plans for more "firsts" and spoke enthusiastically of future tournaments and matches.

For more than thirty years E. Forry Laucks was a generous chess patron, an energetic chess promoter, and a colorful and well-beloved figure at chess gatherings everywhere. It will be hard to imagine a U. S. Open without him.

Here and There . . .

The 1965 **Texas Junior Championship**, played at Texas A & M University on July 17-18, was won by Richard Gray of Houston. Gray, a student at Rice University, scored 4-1 — a tally that was matched by runner-up David Willis of Corpus Christi. Alan Laverty led the 3-2 scorers to place third and also won the award for the best-played game of the tournament. Only one draw was registered in the 11-player Swiss which was sponsored by the M.S.C. Chess Committee of Texas A & M.

The **Atlanta (Ga.) Open**, held on July 17-18, had an entry of 47 players and was won by Brad Wade whose score of 5½-½ placed him a half point ahead of Dave Truesdel and USCF Master Emeritus Norman Whitaker, second and third respectively. All three of the top players went through the schedule undefeated. The tournament was sponsored by the Atlanta Chess Association and was directed by Tom Head.

Wells directed on behalf of the sponsoring San Antonio Chess Club.

David Levin, scoring 4½-½, won the championship of the **Catholic Chess Club** of New Orleans on July 24-25, finishing a full point ahead of runner-up William Hale and third-place James Beck. Nine

players competed in the 5-round Swiss and Beck directed.

The largest tournament ever held at the ancient and famous Mechanics' Institute Chess Room was the **San Francisco Amateur**, played July 10-11. Robert Trenberth of Oakland was tops in the field of 67, turning in a perfect 5-0. Second, with 4½, was Ira Pohl, while Herbert Rosenbaum, Robert L. Henry, William Cornwall, Sam Sloan, and Dennis Balfe all scored 4-1. Class prizes were awarded as follows: Bud Eaton, Bill Caplan, John Smail ("B"); James Bush and Stuart Ockman ("C"); Mark Watson and Dave Nieder (Unrated). K. Michael Goodall was the T.D. and a total of \$225 in prizes were awarded.

The **Chadwick Chess Club Championship**, played in Poughkeepsie, N.Y. was won by Donald Schultz who defeated Dick Meyerson by a score of 2-0 in a playoff match. Each had previously finished first in his section of the club's annual tournament.

USCF Master John Curdo swept to a 5-0 victory in the first annual **Lynn Open**, played in Lynn, Mass. on July 10-11. Thomas McCafferty, Donald V. Haffner, and Alan C. Morrill—all with 4-1—finished second through fourth in

a field of 36.

The eighth annual **Cincinnati Open**, sponsored by the Parkway Chess Club, was played on July 17-18 and drew an entry of 46 players. Winner was Richard Verber of Chicago who edged out Adam Rueckert of Cincinnati on tie-break points. Both players scored 4½-½. David Wolford and Andrew Wishnek finished third and fourth respectively with scores of 4-1.

Twenty-four players were on hand for the **Kanawha Valley Open**, played in Charleston, W. Va. on August 7-8, and five of them turned in identical scores of 4-1 to finish on top of the field. In order of tie break they were David Marples, Charles Boggs, Dr. Alex Darbes, Ronald Kennedy, and Cornelio Nolasco.

The **Northern California Championship**, played at the Mechanics' Institute on July 24-25, was won by Don Sutherland whose score of 4½-½ was equalled by runner-up Carroll Capps. Arthur Wang, Allen Bourke, and Ira Pohl—all with 4-1—were next in the 46-player field. By winning, Sutherland qualified for the California State Championship.

For the third year in a row David Daniels, USCF Expert from Brooklyn, N.Y., won the **Susquehanna Valley Open**. The tournament, played in Bloomsburg, Pa. on July 17-18, this year attracted a record entry of 60 players. Daniels' winning score of 4½-½ was matched

by runner-up Richard Abrams and third place Edgar McCormick. Fourth and fifth, with scores of 4-1, were Richard Pariseau and Robert Durkin. The tournament was sponsored by the Bloomsburg Chess Club and was directed by Mordecai Treblow.

More than two thousand youngsters under 17 competed in the first city-wide tournament of the **New York City Parks Department**, sponsored by the Heckscher Foundation. Swiss preliminaries were held in 370 city playgrounds; district eliminations and borough finals narrowed the field down to two players from each of the city's five boroughs. These ten played a final five-round Swiss at the New York World's Fair: winner in a clean sweep was 16-year-old Bill Smith, who has been playing the game for only six months. Bill is a graduate of Bronx H. S. of Science and is now enrolled in Hunter College. Richard Sulzbach, 3½-1½, finished second, followed by Robert Gwydir, 3-2.

The tournament was originated last year through the efforts of Milton F. Goldstein, who enlisted the support of New York Parks Commissioner Newbold Morris and Mrs. Arthur Smadbeck, president of the Heckscher Foundation. The 1964 event, limited to Manhattan, proved so successful that the tournament was extended throughout the city this summer.

The **Kansas Open**, played in Emporia on July 17-18, was won by Wesley Koehler of Colorado with a sweeping 5-0. John R. Beitling, Kansas City, Mo., was runner-up with 4½. Robert Spies, V. W. Harris and Lee Magee—all with 4-1—finished third through fifth. Harris, a resident of Kansas City, Kansas, was awarded the state championship. Thirty-eight players took part in the tournament which was sponsored by the Emporia State Chess Club.

G. Pat Forsee swept to a 5-0 victory in the championship of the **Louisville (Ky.) Chess Club** on July 31-August 1. Richard O'Bryan, 4-1, was runner-up and Edwin Cohen took third with 3½.

William Batchelder breezed through an eight-player round robin at **Stanford University**, California, with a perfect 7-0. Ed Syrett, with 4½ points, was his closest rival.

Phil Le Cornu reports that membership and tournament activity are at an all-time high at the **Chicago Chess Club**. The club has a thousand square feet of air-conditioned playing space, coffee and cold drinks are available, and a weekly 5-round Swiss has been held every Sunday since May of 1964. In addition, the club ladder tournament has more than 55 players. In the July 11th tournament, Richard Verber won with a score of 4½-½, Walter Grombacher was second with 4-1, and Le Cornu took third with 3½-1½. Details of the club's activities

Probably the first chess tournament ever held in **Greenland** was the championship of **Thule Air Base**, a 6-player round robin, concluded on July 11. It was organized and directed by Chuck Singleton, who scored 4-1 to take second place behind Tim Moore's perfect 5-0.

The second **Vermont Open**, played in Rutland on July 17-18, ended in a three way tie among Alan Morrill, Hartford, Conn.; John Curdo, Lynn, Mass.; Gerald Rubin, Montreal, Canada—all of whom scored 4-1 to lead a field of 20 players. Fourth place went to George Mirijanian, Fitchburg, Mass.

Arizonan Daniel Gollub scored 5-1 to take top honors in the **Denver (Colo.) Open** on July 3-5. Matching Gollub's score, but trailing in median points, was second-place Malcom Kaiser. Kaiser, as highest-scoring Denver resident in the 25-player field, won the city championship. The tournament, sponsored by the Colorado Chess Association and the Central YMCA Chess Club, was directed by George E. Bailey.

The **Bronx Center Chess Club** in New York City (formerly the Westchester-Bronx C.C.) has recently moved to new quarters at 3990 Hillman Avenue. An open house for chessplayers will be held on Friday, September 17, at 8 p.m. Refreshments will be served.

The 1964-5 championship of the **Chicago Industrial Chess League** concluded

with an awards banquet on June 11. James E. Warren, chairman of the League, presented the first place trophy to the Argonne Knights, who finished the season with a perfect 9-0. Second place went to the Argonne Bishops, 8-1, and third to the Western Electric Chargers, 7-2.

The League's 1965-6 season is scheduled to begin with a 30/30 tournament at the Albright Gym, Cermak & 50th, on September 18.

The **Minneapolis Aquatennial** events were held this year over the weekends of July 17-18 and 24-25, proving more successful than ever. In the **3rd Minneapolis Aquatennial Open** a field of 60 players took part in a 5-round Swiss, victory going to Stephan Popel of Fargo, N. Dakota with a straight 5-0. Second was Gerald Ronning of Minneapolis, 4½-½, while 4-1 scores were posted by Curt Brasket, Bloomington, Minn., James H. Young, Coon Rapids, Minn., and Laszlo Ficsor, Minneapolis. The Solkoff tie-break placed them third through fifth in the order listed. Other 4-1 scorers were Robert K. Johnson, Jerome Nolte, and David Tykwinski. Tykwinski won the handicap award, turning in a performance rating 355 points above his USCF rating.

The one-day **Minneapolis Aquatennial Chess Tornado** was held on July 24 and was won by former Minnesota State Champion W. Dane Smith. Smith's score of 3½-½ was matched by runner-up Morton Hamermesh, chairman of the Dept. of Physics at the U. of Minnesota, and Ray McRoberts. Twenty-four players competed.
